Transparency and publishing open data is a long-standing challenge for local and central government organizations in Hungary. Due that full implementation of legal requirement is still lacking, eDemocracy Workshop Association, a Hungarian NGO has decided to start a pilot project in order to prove that full publication of open data defined by law is possible. After a long research period, the local government of Pázmánd undertook not only full transparency but also to implement a pilot project. This exemplary commitment was the main reason of the selection of the initiative.

PROBLEM DEFINITION (required)

The 3200 local governments in Hungary have a crucial role in establishing democracy and delivering public services at local level. However, it is difficult to comply legal requirements and internalize the idea of open local government. EDemocracy Workshop Association's recent research has investigated local government transparency and corruption risks through the analysis of local government websites and personal interviews.

The research showed that non of the participating 317 local governments provides 100% of the obligatory public information on their websites.

For most of the local governments (especially the smaller ones) publishing the required public data means a technological and a political challenge. Citizens all over the country are stuck in classical processes to obtain public data which causes unnecessary difficulties, bureaucracy and leads to the erosion of trust in local public institution

The existing lack of transparency in local decision making processes weakens the trust between citizens and municipalities. Putting focus on this issue from governmental, civic and local governance perspective should empower all stakeholders – citizens, public officials and elected representatives – to achieve change in the current practice of public data handling. Moreover, real progress can only be reached if the local society is involved in this process.

The „Glass Village Project” (project details: <http://eeagrants.org/project-portal/project/HU05-0173> and <http://lvegfalu.hu/>) aims at initiating a dialogue between central government, local governments and citizens on local transparency in order to rebuild public trust.

By creating an adaptable working model of a local government transparency in the village of Pázmánd, the initiative proves that 100% transparency of information that are regulated to be public by law, is possible.

When a working technical solution to fulfill the public data publishing obligations for local governments meets the involvement of local and expert civic groups, a new design of legal, community and technical aspects are becoming the ingredients to significantly improve local data transparency, as a public service delivery.

These are our entry steps to initiate a meaningful dialogue in order to look for long term corrections in the current regulation, practice and cultural habits.

Our initiative's primary target group is the local public administration of Pázmánd (15 people and 250 processes), local people with internet access (700 people), local NGOs and businesses (20-20), and high qualified transparency researchers, experts, central government public officials (50 people).

The secondary target group is the whole population of Pázmánd (2110 people), all local governments in Hungary (a total of 3200), and Hungarian internet users interested in democracy and transparency (2 million people).

Whether it is about co-drafting new law or discussing local issues and policies, access to public information in a simple, and accurate way is essential for every citizen. To provide this information, there are a set of different regulations in Hungary melted into various laws, regulations. However, in practice omission publication of data is not always followed by sanctions. This negative tendency of central and local governments effects all citizens in Hungary.

Our ongoing project tackles these issues by building upon the existing international examples and on Pázmánd's citizen-2013 achievements (Prize for Family friendly local government in 2012 and Pro Voluntaris Prize in 2013) and by gathering the practical knowledge.

We are convinced that a small local government's commitment can make a difference and will lead to a more open approach towards citizens. A dialogue series with government experts and the publications of the research, a country wide campaign and a set of training courses are planned to give a boost to these achievements. Helping committed citizens and the government with trainings and research findings, that not only fiscal transparency is possible at the local level, will empower local groups to initiate change in local practice of public data regulations, and government agencies, to make commitments to fine tune central regulations.

We already have some of our ideas accepted among Hungary's planned 2015-2017 OGP action plan commitments, on how to change the regulations and how to publish different types of public data.

INITIATIVE SUSTAINABILITY (required)

Sustainability is a crucial element of the initiative. Due the strong local political support and the re-election of the current mayor of Pázmánd until 2019, the short and mid-term sustainability of the initiative is assured.

The open and inclusive working method of the local government provides a greater trust and shows evidence-based advantages of openness in personal level. Increasing local government population (3,1% within 5 years), growing tax incomes (almost 60% within 5 years), and over-the-average, strong participation in elections (local: 53% in 2014, votes for the mayor: 68,8% in 2014) are promising feedback for openness and sustainability.

Additionally, Pázmánd's working method and the "Glass Village Project" became a case study used by the National University of Public Service and researched by public administration experts as well. This well-founded and data-proved project can change decision-makers' attitude and enhance local government's commitment to improve public services.

C. THE PITCH

Empowering citizens – in many aspects, Pázmánd is an innovator and forerunner among local governments in Hungary. The local government tries to do the most possible for the future generations: playing corner was established in the local government's office, children's swimming is free and financed by the local government. One of the first earthship community building, a playground with used car tires was established here and a small off-grid community (represented by the Mesefalu Association <http://offgrid.blog.hu/>, also verifier of the claim) is an integral part of the village, where the mayor, one vice-mayor and the notary are female.

Increasing local government population (3,1% within 5 years), growing tax incomes (almost 60% within 5 years), and over-the-average, strong participation in elections (local: 53%, votes for the mayor: 68,8% in 2014) are promising feedback for openness and sustainability.

For better local governments and better public services, access to information is a crucial element. It allows facts-based debates on local issues, well-founded local policies, builds trust, leads do accountability and creates the culture of openness.

Thus Glass Village Project is not only a local project – it is a model, how a community can use their possibilities and set an example for the whole society.
