Comment: The plans to scale up and mitigate risks along the way are somewhat vague.

Comment: The initiative doesn't address challenges and threats. However, all the actors involved in both civil society and government seem to be committed to go ahead with the implementation also considering that the initiative is in the OGP Action Plan.
